- Existing and perspective people working in the City of Rome.




Ted Liddell and Meagan Aaron from Bergmann Associates facilitated multiple interactive activities that engaged participants to think critically and give their ideas on the DRI process and projects. Three stations were set up at the Rooted in Rome event. Rooted in Rome aimed to take a fresh look at the City's assets and demonstrate why Rome is a great community for all generations to live, work, and thrive.

The following is a brief summary of the feedback received at each station.



Station 1: What is the Downtown Revitalization Initiative?

The first station gave a brief description and overview of the DRI process, goals and outcomes. Participants were encouraged to ask any questions they may have on the program, process or study area.










Station 2: Where do you want the \$10 million invested?

Participants were asked to place a dot under the category they would like to see the money invested in. Most of the participants selected Arts & Culture as the category they would like to see the \$10 million invested, followed closely by small business development.






Station 3: What would you like to see in Downtown Rome? Share your ideas for projects in Downtown Rome.

A number of the participants supported more housing being established downtown, but voiced their concern with parking. They stated that currently the downtown core experiences a shortage of parking and by increasing the number of residents in the area, the parking issue would be amplified.

Others stated they would like to see the following established in the downtown core:

- Shops
- Restaurants
- Art studios
- Bakeries
- Big box stores
- Senior living facilities





Other items identified by attendees:

- Implementing sidewalks throughout the City
- Cleaning up West Dominick Street and West Liberty Street
- Incentivize homeowners to maintain and improve their property
- Incentivize young families to stay in Rome
- Increase educational programs for at risk youth
- Promote small businesses
- Increase safety for pedestrians and cyclists during winter months
- Beautify Rome!
- Along the periphery, outside of the DRI study area participants noted that there are pockets of crime
