

EDUCATE FOR THE FUTURE.

The Rome City School District has a proud history and a bright future. Rome Free Academy (RFA) was one of the first public schools in upstate New York. In 2002, a new Rome Free Academy was opened on the Griffiss Business and Technology Park. This attractive, spacious and modern facility currently enrolls about 1,600 high school students.

The District has six elementary schools serving grades K-4, one upper elementary school for grades 5-6, one middle school for grades 7-8, and a high school for grades 9-12. There are two Early Childhood Programs, prekindergarten and Forever Growing, which recently moved into a newly renovated space next door to the District Offices. Currently, Rome is implementing a \$30 million capital project to renovate and upgrade five elementary schools to ensure the spaces are appropriate and adequate for 21st century learners.

SEE YOURSELF IN ROME.

Rome boasts 5 commercial, cultural and recreational districts. Downtown Rome has a variety of unique and distinct entertainment districts. Residents and visitors can dine and shop along the North James Street Corridor or in the Little Italy District. Those who love outdoor adventures can boat or kayak on the Erie Canal and enjoy a variety of arts and cultural attractions, such as the Capitol Theatre or Veteran's Memorial Park.

Rome is a hotbed of historical treasures with 10 attractions on the National Register of Historic Places and countless local landmarks. Residents are proud of the significant role that Rome played during the Revolutionary War. Fort Stanwix National Monument represents a major turning point in America's defeat of the British in the 1777 battle at Saratoga. Those who want to take a deep dive into the battle can have a guided tour at the Marinus Willett Center to experience a day in the life of a Revolutionary War hero. Other attractions that contribute to Rome's rich history are Arsenal House, Gansevoort-Bellamy Historic District, Jervis Public Library, Mills House and Zion Church.
